In reply to **the Hon. S.C. MULLIGHAN (Lee)** (18 November 2020).

The Hon. R.I. LUCAS (Treasurer): I have been advised the following:

The cumulative real Gross State Product (GSP) growth over the period in question (2021-22 to 2023-24) is forecast to be 10.6 per cent.

Since official records of GSP began in 1990-91, South Australia's GSP grew in real terms by:

- 4.1 per cent in 1995-96, followed by 3.8 per cent in 1996-97, and 5.4 per cent in 1997-98—cumulative growth of 13.9 per cent.
- 5.0 per cent in 2001-02, followed by 2.5 per cent in 2002-03 and 3.2 per cent in 2003-04—cumulative growth of 11.0 per cent.
- 4.8 per cent in 2007-08, followed by 2.8 per cent in 2008-09 and 2.0 per cent in 2009-10—cumulative growth of 9.8 per cent.

TARGETED VOLUNTARY SEPARATION PACKAGES

In reply to **Mr GEE (Taylor)** (18 November 2020).

The Hon. R.I. LUCAS (Treasurer): The following information is provided on behalf of all Ministers:

Agencies have advised that a total of 872 TVSPs and executive separations (761.1 FTEs) were accepted during 2019-20, and that the following expenses were incurred (excluding payments associated with accrued leave):

- TVSP and executive separation payments—\$73.9 million
- Payroll tax and shared services fees—\$1.1 million

Expenses associated with 754 acceptances were centrally reimbursed—\$64.0 million for TVSP and executive separation payments and \$1.0 million for payroll tax and shared services fees.

Agencies met costs associated with the other 118 acceptances—\$9.9 million for TVSP and executive separation payments and \$0.1 million for payroll tax and shared services fees.

In a number of cases there is a difference between acceptance and separation dates.

Other than in specific circumstances approved by the government where significant reform activity is underway, agencies are responsible for managing costs associated with TVSPs and separation payments.

The Hon. R.I. LUCAS (Treasurer): I have been advised the following:

ReturnToWorkSA has reviewed its data collection options for reporting against dispute outcomes as indicated in recommendation 3 of the Mansfield report.

Whilst ReturnToWorkSA is able to report the final outcome of decisions, including if the decision is confirmed, set aside, set aside and substituted, varied or discontinued at the various stages of dispute, this does not enable an assessment or recoding of whether the outcome was more or less favourable than the original disputed decision referred to in the Mansfield recommendation. ReturnToWorkSA has worked with the South Australian Employment Tribunal (SAET) to develop more comprehensive reporting on SAET outcomes. However this continues to be work in progress.

Most applications for review in the SAET are brought to conclusion by consent orders. Consent orders may reflect new information that comes to light after the disputed decision is made, and are often reached for commercial or other reasons unique to individual cases. As such, data about consent orders may not accurately reflect the disputed decision's merits.

ReturnToWorkSA continues to work with its claims agents and the South Australian Employment Tribunal to investigate further opportunities to enhance the information recorded about disputes.

The context for this question is the capital works program and round 1 and 2 projects that may be progressing past the December 2021 target date with some non-classroom related works which will continue into 2022.

At this stage there is only one project that falls in this category as reported by the Department for Infrastructure and Transport which is Norwood Morialta High School.

Currently all other round 1 and 2 projects are scheduled for completion before or by December 2021.

SCHOOL INFRASTRUCTURE PROJECTS

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

The budget papers provide an anticipated expenditure based on projected milestones for projects within a financial year. The projected expenditure for 2019-20 was based on anticipated programs and projected cashflows to deliver the capital program.

A number of factors impact on the difference between predicted and actual expenditure including the stage of the project. Expenditure encompasses fees for project management, architectural services and cost management services, with the bulk of budgets going towards construction expenditure. Some projects had initial projections for commencing construction late in 2019-20 but did not commence construction until the 2020-21 financial year due to extended concept and design phases for some school upgrades.

I am advised that since late 2019, the Department for Education has worked with the Department for Infrastructure and Transport to improve budget setting.

I also note that the 2019-20 revised budget for these projects in question totalled \$120.5 million.

THE HEIGHTS SCHOOL CAPITAL WORKS

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

The Heights School was allocated a \$10 million budget under the Department for Education's capital works program. The Heights School capital works project is currently in construction to deliver the following scope:

- a new primary learning facility with contemporary classrooms, surrounding a central covered outdoor learning area
- a new gymnasium with an international size sports court for physical education, assemblies, performances and presentations
- demolition of ageing infrastructure.

In May 2020, the final pre-tender estimate provided by the project's cost manager indicated that the project was over the approved budget of \$10 million by 3.3 per cent prior to going to tender. Following the tender process, the recommended tenderer that was awarded the construction contract was favourable and this project is anticipated to therefore be delivered at or within the allocated project budget.

Under the department's capital works program, contracts are awarded through a competitive tender process following a rigorous evaluation. Savings from any projects that come in under budget are retained by the Department for Education to be used as a pool of funding for managing any cost pressures that may arise for projects that come in over budget or face particular cost pressures due to unforeseen issues. This is standard practice for Department for Education capital works programs over many years and is a key component in mitigating risk to the delivery of the overall program of works.

EDUCATION DEPARTMENT BUDGET

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I have advised of the following:

The percentage of the increase in the overall Department for Education budget to 2023-24 that can be attributed to enrolment growth inclusive of year 7 to high school is estimated at 18 per cent. This is a point in time estimate.

SCHOOLS, SPECIAL OPTIONS PLACEMENTS

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I have been advised of the following:

At the conclusion of the 2020 school year, there were 37 eligible students who were unable to be offered a place in a specialised education option for the 2021 school year. All students have a transition plan to ensure they are well supported in a mainstream class. This compares to 88 at the same period in 2019. Data has only been centrally

collected since 2019. Analysis of historical data suggests there were 260 in 2018 and 285 in 2017 that were unable to be offered a place for the following school year.

For the northern and southern metropolitan areas:

Northern

- There were no students who were unable to be offered a place in junior primary special options.
- There were five students who were unable to be offered a place in primary special options. All students were recommended for a special class placement.
- There were two students who were unable to be offered a place in secondary special options. Both students were recommended for a special class placement.

Southern

- There were no students who were unable to be offered a place in junior primary and primary special options.
- There were 22 students who were unable to be offered a place within secondary special options. Twenty were recommended for a special class and two recommended for a special unit/school placement.

SACE COMPLETION

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Moriaita—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

The quality of the retention and completion data being captured has improved.

From 2018 the Department for Education has tracked individual student progress while at school for a more accurate reflection of retention rates and SACE completions. This information is now published annually. The latest report detailing retention and completion rates from 2015 to 2019 is available to the public on the Department for Education website.

In relation to retention rates, it is important to note the student exits may include to either gain employment or for further study, or to transition to an interstate, overseas or non-government school. The development of a national 'unique student identifier' (USI) is currently underway as a result of the National School Reform Agreement signed in 2018. This USI will assist in tracking the students in the future.

As part of the commitment to better understand impediments to progress, a research report involving interviews with 580 year 10-12 students from 101 schools who have either left school early or appear to be at risk of not completing SACE was published on 2 December 2020. It provides detailed insights into where students who leave prior to completing SACE have gone and what can be done to support them into work or further study.

The findings will help inform the department's policies and programs to ensure that students are supported into meaningful pathways.

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

Section 4 of DPC Circular PC013—Annual Reporting Requirements details the use of the annual report template. The template includes sections for an organisational structure and changes to the agency to be included by each agency.

I refer the member for Wright to the annual reports which will be published for each of the agencies for which I am responsible.

FAMILY DAY CARE

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

As at 3 December 2020, the actual number of departmental employees who undertake the work of coordinating the operations of the family day care and respite care programs was 54. This includes monitoring and supporting educators/care providers and administering payments to educators and care providers.

FAMILY DAY CARE

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

There will be no immediate change to family day care services for educators or families.

The Department for Education is committed to supporting continuity and growth for family day care services.

If non-government provider/s take over as the approved provider/s of family day care services, family day care educators will be supported by an approved provider other than the Department for Education.

There are very clear obligations and responsibilities outlined in Education and Care Services National Law that all approved providers must meet regardless of whether they are a government or non-government provider.

Under this law approved providers of an approved family day care service are responsible for:

- ensuring the safety, health and wellbeing of the children being educated and cared for by the service
- meeting the educational and developmental needs of the children being educated and cared for by the service
- ensuring sufficient persons are appointed as family day care co-ordinators

- ensuring each family day care educator is monitored and supported by a family day care co-ordinator.

In addition there will be no immediate change to respite care services for care providers or families. The obligations and responsibilities under the National Disability Insurance Scheme must be met regardless of whether they are a government or non- government provider.

FAMILY DAY CARE AND RESPITE CARE

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Moriaita—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

Family day care educators and respite care providers are small business operators. Family day care educators set their own child care fees independently. Fees for respite care providers are set by the service in line with the National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) price guidelines.

The Department for Education operates the Family Day Care and Respite Care Program on a cost recovery basis.

Costs associated with the operation of the family day care program are covered through an educator levy paid by each educator and a parent administration levy. These levies were last increased in March 2019 to 95c per hour per child and 30 cents per hour, per child respectively.

The 2020 annual increase of these levies was placed on hold due to the impacts of COVID-19 and requirements under the Australian Government Early Childhood Education and Care Relief Package to not increase fees between April and July 2020.

Costs associated with the Respite Care Program, including payment of care providers, are covered through the hourly fee charged to families in line with the NDIS price guide.

RESPITE CARE

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Moriaita—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) publishes a price guide that sets price limits for each of the supports the Respite Care Program provides.

Changes to prices are updated by the NDIS to respond to market trends and changes in costs and are generally identified through an annual price review, with any new prices outlined in an updated price guide, effective 1 July each year.

The Respite Care Program which the Department for Education operates sets an hourly fee in line with the NDIS price guide and then passes on part of this hourly fee as a payment to the care provider.

FAMILY DAY CARE AND RESPITE CARE

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Moriaita—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

Family day care educators and respite care providers are small business operators. Family day care educators set their own child care fees independently. Fees for respite care providers are set by the service in line with the National Disability Insurance Scheme price guidelines.

In 2019 the Department for Education explored if there was a better way to support the small businesses offering family day care and respite care through a market engagement process. This found that there was sufficient market interest from reputable providers in a transfer of existing family day care and respite care services.

We are now moving to an approach to market.

Through this process we will be detailing the conditions of any transfer.

Through the approach to market the intention is to minimise any disruption to educators, care providers and families ensuring that every educator and care provider is able to continue operating their business.

FAMILY DAY CARE AND RESPITE CARE

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Moriaita—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

The National Disability Insurance Scheme (NDIS) sets the price limit for services. As a NDIS registered provider, the department can charge a 'NDIS participant' for an approved service up to that price limit. As a NDIS registered provider, the Department for Education approves self-employed carers called 'care providers' to provide respite services to families. The amount that the department, as a registered provider, pays out to a carer is based on a contractual arrangement with the carer.

The hourly rate which is provided by NDIS to the department as a registered provider is currently \$51 per hour with \$29 per hour paid to a carer providing 1:1 support and \$23 per child per hour for support provided to multiple children.

Under the NDIS, charges or other fees outside the price guide are not allowed.

The gap between the hourly NDIS payment (\$51) and the payment to the care provider (\$29 or \$23) is used by the department to cover the cost of operating the service with department staff responsible for overseeing the program, supporting respite care placements, monitoring the quality of care being provided and the safety, health and wellbeing of children in care.

KINGSTON EARLY LEARNING CENTRE

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

The rural care budget allocates places based on sufficient demonstrated demand to cover child care staff wages, as well as adequate physical capacity for the children. I am informed that from the start of the 2021 school year there is sufficient demand and physical capacity to provide an additional rural care worker for a further one day a week at the Kingston Early Learning Centre.

As at 3 December 2020, 32 children are on the waiting list at the Kingston Early Learning Centre. This includes a number of children already attending the rural care program at Kingston Early Learning Centre, but whose parents/carers are seeking a change in which days they attend, or additional days.

PRESCHOOL ASSESSMENTS

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

At 30 September 2020, 370 (98 per cent) government preschools have been assessed and rated.

NON-GOVERNMENT SCHOOL LOANS SCHEME

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

During the 2019-20 financial year 14 schools lodged applications for loans from the Non-Government School Loans Scheme.

Of these 14 applications:

- one approved application was withdrawn by the respective school
- one application was not supported as it was not compliant with the scheme's guidelines
- one application was not supported as it did not demonstrate a clear need for the loan consistent with the scheme's guidelines or its objective; and
- the remaining 11 applications were approved and executed loan agreements.

NON-GOVERNMENT SCHOOL GRANTS

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

There were more applications than funding available. Fifteen applications were not successful due to their funding being sourced elsewhere, or the projects had lower educational benefit using the fund criteria.

TAFE SA

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

In 2020 TAFE SA adapted to become more agile in the way it delivered its courses during the coronavirus pandemic, and plans to continue this into 2021 to support greater student accessibility to learning vocational education and training opportunities at TAFE SA across the state.

TAFE SA continues to work with students, employers, industry and communities to understand what they require whilst also ensuring training package requirements are met.

TAFE SA

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Morialta—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

TAFE SA identified approximately 980 applicants who had expressed interest in the 20 courses. TAFE SA has contacted the applicants via phone and email to provide them with the information they need to make decisions about their future studies.

TAFE SA

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Moriaita—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

TAFE SA implements class size ratios to ensure its students receive the support they need and receive a high-quality learning experience.

Class size ratios tend to vary between qualifications and activities due to several factors including safety, the learning needs and experience of the student cohort, the availability of ICT and physical infrastructure, and more recently, social distancing requirements due to the global coronavirus pandemic.

Minimum class size ratios at TAFE SA can vary anywhere between six and 18 students per class dependent upon the location, the type of learning experience (general, apprenticeship, school), and the factors mentioned above.

GOVERNMENT ADVERTISING

In reply to **Mr BOYER (Wright)** (23 November 2020).

The Hon. J.A.W. GARDNER (Moriaita—Minister for Education): I am advised of the following:

Department for Education

At 30 June 2020, 23.9 FTEs were allocated to communication and promotion functions, costing \$2.474 million (excluding on-costs) against an original budget of 28.3 FTEs and an original expenditure budget of \$2.766 million.

The Department for Education Communications directorate produces internal and external communications for the department's schools and preschools including media management, creative services (including graphic design, videography and photography), social media, webinar production, website and intranet management. External audiences include parents, students, stakeholders and the general public.

There is no central budgeted cost for advertising campaign activity in 2020-21.

TAFE SA

At 30 June 2020, 17.3 FTE were employed to undertake activity relating to communication and marketing functions within TAFE SA with total employment expense of \$2.0 million.

The TAFE SA marketing and communications units undertake a range of functions including but not limited to, promotional and functional marketing and advertising, TAFE SA website management, media management, and internal and external communication.

For 2020-21 the budgeted FTE for communication and promotion activities within TAFE SA is 18.8 with budgeted total employment expense of \$2.2 million.

Budgeted FTE and employment expense for 2021-22, 2022-23 and 2023-24 within TAFE SA has not yet been finalised.

SACE Board of South Australia

At 30 June 2020, 4.8 FTEs were allocated to functions which include communication and promotion and other activities, costing \$512,805 for the financial year.

The activities performed by staff are diverse across the function of both marketing and communications and incorporate marketing, internal and external communications, stakeholder liaison and communication, graphic design, meeting and event coordination, website and intranet management. Communications are integral to the SACE Board services, for example to provide information and support to educators about changes to curriculum and assessment requirements. Similarly, the professional learning offered by the SACE Board is promoted through our communication channels.

Since 1 July 2019, the following new sections have been established within the Department of Human Services (DHS):

- Following machinery of government changes, the Community and Family Services Division was established in July 2019 to consolidate direct service delivery and commissioning of non-government

child abuse and neglect, early intervention, and prevention services that were previously spread across DHS, the Department for Education and the Department for Child Protection.

- The Strategic Reform Programs directorate was established in November 2019 to provide high level governance and project management capability to support the department's strategic projects to deliver on its strategic plan.

Since 1 July 2019, one new section has been established within SA Housing Authority, the Office for Homelessness Sector Integration.

The purpose of the Office for Homelessness Sector Integration is to partner across government and work with service providers, stakeholders and communities to prevent and reduce homelessness, through targeted and tailored responses.

The Hon. S.G. WADE (Minister for Health and Wellbeing): I have been advised:

On 7 April 2020, Department for Health and Wellbeing (DHW) Safety and Quality Unit became aware of Ms Smith's death after a Coroner's notice was logged into the Safety Learning System by Royal Adelaide Hospital staff.

The South Australian Ambulance (SAAS) had already notified South Australian Police and the Health and Community Services Complaints Commissioner.

The matter was then included in a report to the SA Health chief executive's weekly executive meeting.

Safety and Quality Unit DHW, notified Wellbeing SA and legal advice was sought regarding information sharing with NDIA and NDIS Quality and Safeguards Commission (the NDIS Commission).

The Safety and Quality Unit DHW notified the NDIS Commission. The NDIS Commission then wrote to the Safety and Quality Unit DHW requesting health records of Ms Smith to be released to them to assist in their investigation.

The Adult Safeguarding Unit, within Office for Ageing Well, became aware of Ms Smith's death on 25 May 2020, when it was reported in the media.

The Adult Safeguarding Unit works with adults at risk of abuse to develop a safeguarding plan in accordance with a person's wishes and unique circumstances.

Given it's legislative remit, there was no role for the Adult Safeguarding Unit subsequent to Ms Smith's death.

CHILD AND ADOLESCENT MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES

In reply to **Mr PICTON (Kaurna)** (26 November 2020).

The Hon. S.G. WADE (Minister for Health and Wellbeing): I have been advised:

1. All referrals are assessed by trained and experienced clinicians. Urgent referrals and concerns are actioned within hours or days if clinically required. The average time from referral to offer of appointment for non-urgent booked referrals is approximately 2-3 weeks which is comparable with other CAMHS tertiary mental health services throughout Australia.

2. The CAMHS community based services do not have a waiting list.

3. There have been 52 incidents of seclusion and 2 incidents of separate restraint without the need for seclusion reported to the Safety Learning System during July to November 2020. Notably, 27 of these incidents related to one client with protracted acute drug-induced psychosis, who was later transferred to an adult mental health facility.

4. Reporting and monitoring of restrictive practice occurs monthly through the Strategic Mental Health Quality Improvement Committee. There is no record of concerns raised within the minutes for 2020.

5. CAMHS are currently providing clinical services via a fly-in-fly-out model for regional and remote communities such as Whyalla and Ceduna due to recruitment challenges. Staff within country sites are also providing extensive drive-in-drive-out services to a number of regional communities such as Balaklava, Clare, Peterborough and Roxby Downs.

CAMHS has worked with the University of Adelaide to offer placements in country areas.

Recruitment challenges also continues to be on the agenda for the SA Health Statewide Psychology Advisory Group.

6. A final business case is expected in the first half of 2021.

HEALTH HEROES HOTEL

In reply to **Mr PICTON (Kaurna)** (26 November 2020).

The Hon. S.G. WADE (Minister for Health and Wellbeing): I have been advised:

During the first wave SA Health had several hotel options available where staff could and did stay.

Hotel for heroes options are being developed to link with the establishment of a COVID-19 positive dedicated facility. A suitable hotel for staff working at the COVID-19 positive facility has been selected and contract negotiations are continuing.

COVID-19, HOTEL QUARANTINE

In reply to **Mr PICTON (Kaurna)** (26 November 2020).

The Hon. S.G. WADE (Minister for Health and Wellbeing): I have been advised:

As at 18 January 2021, swabbing of the environment is not a nationally recommended practice. SA Health continues to follow advice from the National Infection Control Expert group (ICEG) and Australian Health Protection Principal Committee (AHPPC).

COVID-19, HOTEL QUARANTINE

In reply to **Mr PICTON (Kaurna)** (26 November 2020).

The Hon. S.G. WADE (Minister for Health and Wellbeing): I have been advised:

1. As at 15 January 2021, MSS subcontract to Lima One, GMS and KM.
2. The Minister delegated the approval to the Department for Health and Wellbeing. The delegate provided written approval for MSS Security to subcontract as required to fill roles within the medi-hotels.
3. MSS subcontracted since the commencement of medi-hotel operations, which was 29 March 2020.
4. As at 15 January 2021, there are three sub-contractors.
5. MSS is required to seek approval for any subcontracting element through the SA Health Agency Security Adviser.
6. MSS Security subcontract for hospital services as well as hotel quarantine services.

MEDI-HOTELS

In reply to **Mr PICTON (Kaurna)** (26 November 2020).

The Hon. S.G. WADE (Minister for Health and Wellbeing): I have been advised:

1. An attachment to the contract details a range of matters that providers [hotels] must comply with including infection control and required training of staff.
2. Hotel staff attend training sessions provided by the Infection Control Service and are expected to complete pre-request online infection control pre-learning. This is then followed by a face to face training session which includes PPE donning and doffing and COVID-19 infection control training.
3. As at 31 October 2020, a direction was issued to all medi-hotel workers preventing them to work across multiple medi-hotel sites, or other high risk areas, such as aged care facilities and metro/regional hospital sites.
4. Infection control procedures have been drafted by SA Health.
5. Shared hotel facilities are subject to regular cleaning. 'High touch points', such as microwave ovens, are subject to more frequent cleaning. Individual staff are also encouraged to clean shared areas after use and to bring their own utensils or use disposable utensils.

MENTAL HEALTH CARE CENTRE
